

It was 59 years ago that St. Louisans celebrated the completion of the Gateway Arch—a monument representing dreams and discovery and an icon signaling the pride of the St. Louis region. The big idea behind the Arch wasn't just to shine a spotlight on our city, but it was also to design a space that would revive the riverfront.

That spirit of doing big things to support our region's vibrancy and accessibility has never waned. The CityArchRiver Project led by the Arch Alliance exemplified this commitment. This project brought together public and private entities to make Gateway Arch National Park, the Mississippi Riverfront, and Kiener Plaza easier to access and safer for everyone by connecting and invigorating the park's grounds and museums.

Last month, we again stood up to ensure that we—as St. Louisans—would play an integral role in the future of downtown. On September 19, we announced alongside our partners our plans to purchase the Millennium Hotel site. This critical location has been vacant since 2014, so when there was an opportunity to submit an offer, we knew we had to seize the moment.

This project beautifully aligns with our mission to better connect Gateway Arch National Park and its surroundings and nurture a vibrant, world-class experience for both residents and visitors from around the world. We will work tirelessly to ensure the community's priorities and best interests will be front and center, which means that St. Louis will have a role in what happens with this site—our region deserves that.

As we stood with our partners to announce this news, I was reminded that our community can take on monumental tasks when we do it together. Greater St. Louis, Inc., the City of St. Louis, and the St. Louis Development Corporation are with us every step of the way, showcasing yet again the importance of cross-sector collaborations for our region's success.

We also have the courage to pursue bold ideas because of you—our supporters. I hope you, too, feel that sense of civic pride when we take on transformational projects such as this. You made this happen. And, we hope news like this encourages others to join the effort.

This project is also not that different from what we do every single day at Gateway Arch Park Foundation. Produced in collaboration with the National Blues Museum and the National Park Service, the Festival hosted a curated lineup of talented blues artists that took a record-breaking audience of more than 15,500 people through a weekend celebration of blues across genres.

Fourth annual Winterfest 5K returns to Downtown St. Louis

As cooler temps arrive, the Foundation eagerly awaits the kickoff of our annual Winterfest celebration with the Winterfest 5K on November 23. This 5K run is the perfect way to get outside and explore St. Louis while supporting our mission. Continue the tradition or start a new one by joining us on our unique downtown route.

Runners will take a scenic journey through Downtown St. Louis and Gateway Arch National Park. Beginning in Kiener Plaza, they'll get a first glimpse of the Winterfest decorations, jog past the Old Courthouse, and enter Gateway Arch National Park. On the grounds, they'll traverse through the 91-acre park, taking in sights such as the North Gateway, reflection ponds, the Riverfront, and, of course, the Arch! All participants will receive a medal and t-shirt, with winners receiving a special prize.

Those who still want to participate at a more leisurely pace can check out the 1-mile Fun Run/Walk! This route takes participants on a loop around the Gateway Arch, so you'll still take in that iconic view before crossing the finish line. And, for the first time ever, we are offering ice skating immediately following the 5K. Be sure to stick around and take a victory lap around the ice.

Philanthropy Supports Park Projects

Beyond our highly visible projects and programs, like riverfront cleanups and free community events, we are proud to support Gateway Arch National Park in ways that may not be immediately noticeable to the two million visitors that come to the park each year.





North Gateway Power Project

The 7.5-acre North Gateway in the park is a natural amphitheater, making it an ideal space for special events and concerts throughout the year, including our Blues at the Arch Festival. To better support existing events and attract future event organizers, we funded the work to bring additional power to this area of the park. This project was completed in July.

New Welcome Desks

Work is underway to find new solutions for the existing Visitor Center Desk and welcome desk outside of Tucker Theater. The new desks will allow park staff to better assist visitors looking for general information, Junior Ranger activities, accessibility services, and park passes. The desks will also feature the National Park Service arrowhead logo.

Updating Wayside Maps

Throughout the 91 acres of the park, there are more than 16 maps that provide helpful historical and directional information to visitors. With age and constant sun exposure, these waysides have faded and are difficult to read. We are currently working with the park to fund a project to update these signs with better protection from the elements and provide higher graphic contrast to make them accessible to those with visual impairments.



For years, they have been a committed partner to Gateway Arch Park Foundation, showing their support on efforts from Winterfest to the recently announced intent to purchase the Millennium Hotel property.

Their foresight, expertise, and convening power makes Greater St. Louis, Inc. a trusted and essential collaborator. We caught up with Kurt Weigle, Greater St. Louis, Inc.'s Chief Downtown Officer, to talk about why Gateway Arch National Park and the work of the Foundation are unique and critical assets to the future of St. Louis.

You're relatively new to St. Louis—you moved here in 2022. What were some of your first impressions of the Arch and the surrounding grounds?

It may sound trite, but there is a magnetism to Gateway Arch National Park that immediately struck me when I moved here. It is an extraordinary international asset that represents innovation, creativity, new beginnings, and a grit that is so unique to this region. I think it's important to remind ourselves how special this monument is—it's always there, so it's easy to get used to it, but it really is something that we shouldn't shy away from when it comes to planning for St. Louis.

When I think about the future of our city, I think about how we can continue to anchor activity to the Arch. Take Paris as an example. Restaurants throughout that city have chairs facing sidewalks to watch people walk by. But—as soon as the Eiffel Tower is within the line of sight, all cafe chairs point towards the iconic monument.

I know we're a very different city than Paris, but I think we have the opportunity to do something similar and really special here—all things can point to the Arch, its beauty, and what it represents for St. Louis.

You've had leadership roles in the downtown revitalization of other major cities like New Orleans and Detroit. What do you think makes St. Louis unique?

One of the things that continues to impress me about St. Louis—historically and today—is that we are a city and a region that produces things with our hands. We manufacture fighter jets, automobiles, electronics, and let's not forget about beer! I think that creates a psyche that just feels different from other cities. We're not Silicon Valley, and we shouldn't try to be.

I believe what we make translates to the culture of our city. St. Louis and St. Louisans have guts. We've faced adversity in the past, but it has contributed to our toughness. The Finnish have a phrase called "Sisu"—it means strength of will, determination, perseverance, and acting rationally in the face of adversity. There's no one word that serves as a translation, but I think St. Louis represents the essence of it.

In fact, the video that you see at Gateway Arch National Park about the construction of the Arch speaks to the persona of St. Louis. You can feel that sense of pride the designers and the construction workers brought to their work—it was seeping out of them from St. Louis, in St. Louis, and for St. Louis. I still feel that today.

A lot of your work is about partnership. What makes a successful partnership, and why does Gateway Arch Park Foundation make a strong partner for big projects like the Millennium Hotel project?

A good partnership comes down to trust and commitment. Greater St. Louis, Inc. and Gateway Arch Park Foundation have always had inherent trust, not just on an organizational level but person to person, working alongside each other for the greater good of the community. When you have that kind of faith in your partners, almost anything is possible.

Creative problem solving is also essential to strong collaboration. We've always found that in our work with Gateway Arch Park Foundation, and the Millennium Hotel project is a perfect example of that. A massive hotel sat vacant in our downtown; our two organizations banded together with the St. Louis Development Corporation to think outside the box. To think what would happen if...how could we work together to... how could we ensure St. Louis is part of the future redevelopment? We are so grateful for the leadership of Gateway Arch Park Foundation on this effort.

You spend a lot of time downtown. You work here, you live here. Do you have a favorite memory about downtown?

It was a very simple moment, almost a meditative one. I was sitting in City Garden on a national holiday. I heard the trickle of water, the voices of children playing, the smell of freshly-cut grass, the grand sight of the Arch, the feel of a cool breeze. I honestly thought to myself...wow it doesn't get much better than this. It's one of my favorite moments because everyone around me was enjoying downtown in different ways. Some were reading books, kids were playing in the fountain, others were eating lunch—as a community everyone was in the same space, enjoying the day in the shadow of the Arch. It was really quite special.

In March 2020, the Old Courthouse closed its doors to the public due to the COVID-19 pandemic, like many other attractions, businesses, and offices. But, planning for the building's renovations continued behind the scenes to ensure that visitors would experience and connect with the Old Courthouse in new ways and learn about the significant moments in American history that occurred at this site.

St. Louis-based Tarlton Corporation and Trivers were selected for construction, while U.K.-based Haley Sharpe Design focused on designing four new museum exhibit galleries. The Universal Design Group and the Dred Scott Heritage Foundation were also closely involved in pre-planning to ensure accessibility and historical accuracy would be present throughout the courthouse. In January 2023, community members and civic leaders joined with the National Park Service and the Foundation to officially kick off the historic renovations.

Last year saw several major milestones in the Old Courthouse's rehabilitation project. Non-historic walls and ceilings were torn down, and outdated appliances like radiators, air conditioners, and fire suppression systems were removed. An elevator shaft and large elevator bays were created in the building's first and second floor hallways while crews installed modern piping, ventilation, electrical, and heating systems throughout the building's skeleton. By 2024, the inner-workings of the building had been entirely modernized.



This past summer, the focus shifted to restoring the building's public-facing features. Plaster walls were repaired and ceilings were installed in preparation for incoming exhibits and office spaces. A curved, glass guardrail was installed on the second floor of the building's iconic rotunda to improve visitor safety and maintain visibility for guests. On top of improved walls and floors, the courthouse's four wings and gift shop space were updated with bright, adjustable lighting, which will complement future exhibits, artwork, and merchandise. As construction fencing comes down this fall, those who live and work downtown will notice the building's exterior changes, including restored exterior windows and accessible entrance ramps.

The building's first elevator was also installed this summer. This two-story, family-sized elevator is specially designed to bring guests with mobility challenges and other members of their party between the first and second floors of the building, creating a universally accessible visitor experience.





Looking ahead to early 2025, the building will soon welcome four new museum galleries in its first-floor wings. These exhibits will feature information on the legacy of Dred and Harriet Scott, African American life in St. Louis during the pre- and post-Civil War eras, the role of courts in society, and the architectural, art, and craftsmanship features of the Old Courthouse. Meanwhile, National Park Service staff will return to their updated offices on the building's second floor.

These historic renovations would not be complete without you, our St. Louis community, to enjoy them. A grand reopening ceremony and festival will take place in late Spring 2025, featuring distinguished speakers, musical performances, and interactive activities—a celebration not to be missed—followed by programming from the National Park Service and park partners throughout the year. We look forward to seeing visitors in the halls of the Old Courthouse again.

Bio Blitz/iNaturalist

GAPF Launches New Ecological Monitor Volunteer Position



Earlier this year, we introduced a brand-new volunteer initiative that spans all four Foundation mission pillars: community programming, conservation, preservation, and education. Even in its urban landscape, many native species call Gateway Arch National Park home, and our new Ecological Monitor Position works to identify them, with the help of data from park visitors and volunteers.

Using a smartphone app called iNaturalist, these keen-eyed volunteers take pictures of birds, insects, arachnids, and other creatures seen throughout the park. The park, St. Louis community members, and more can then access and use this data to know which critters are living on the grounds. In the past few months alone, there have been nearly 200 observations of 88 species made by over 50 volunteers, with around 300 other "eco-monitors" chiming in to suggest species' identifications.

During April's National Park Week, we also hosted Gateway Arch National Park's first-ever BioBlitz in partnership with the National Park Service.

A BioBlitz is an event that focuses on finding and identifying as many species as possible in a specific area over a short period of time, usually 24 hours. Our first BioBlitz was such a success that we hosted a second session during National Public Lands Day on September 28.

Beyond making an impact for Gateway Arch National Park, this program has also broadened the Foundation's volunteer efforts by offering a more science-based and time-flexible option for those looking to get involved locally and an opportunity to get outside and explore the park in a new way. In addition to drawing urban ecology enthusiasts, it provides another way for families or more independent volunteers to get involved.

If this program sounds like something you'd enjoy, head to our website to register to become a volunteer. Winter is one of the best times of the year for observations since there are fewer people out and new varieties of species to discover.


